School Uniform - Dressing for Excellence

Uniform is an important part of our school identity. It reinforces who we are as a community and allows students to feel pride in their school. It also helps prepare pupils for life after school where many will have to dress smartly for work.

Over the past three sessions, there has been a significant improvement in our standards of uniform. An increasing number of pupils are now wearing blazers and I am delighted to report that 96% of pupils are now wearing all black footwear. A big thank you to you as parents/carers for supporting this.

Our main driving force for striving towards 100% of pupils wearing black shoes is to ensure equity for all: that no pupil or parent feel pressured to wear/buy an expensive pair of "converse style" trainers. This was highlighted by our pupils through our pupil voice.

Our improved standards of uniform is also coinciding with our increasing pattern of attainment, which I would suggest is partly connected.

The wearing of school uniform:

- Is invaluable in conveying a sense of community, wellbeing and purpose.
- Indicates a sense of pride in the school and helps pupils to form positive attitudes to the school and their school work.
- · Protects children from the harmful effects of social distinction and competitive dressing.
- Promotes the school's identity in their community, with our immediate neighbours, local business and industry.
- Assists staff in the task of supervising pupils and keeping unwelcome visitors out of the school.

A reminder of our school uniform requirements. St Benedict's High School's policy is that all of our pupils are required to wear the school uniform.

The School Uniform consists of:

- A white school shirt/blouse, and school tie which is visible at all times. S4, S5 and S6 will wear the Senior tie.
- Tailored black trousers or black skirt leggings, jeans, denim and tracksuits, are not acceptable under any circumstances.
- · A school blazer with badge.
- Comfortable footwear (black in colour).
- Plain black jumper or cardigan (optional). Black school jumpers should be of an unbranded style that allows the school tie to be clearly seen (v-neck). Hoodies are not allowed.





Chaplaincy

The theme for this year's Catholic Education Week, 'Celebrating and Worshipping', was designed to help us reflect upon how our schools are communities of faith and learning, characterised by our celebration and worship.


We can list many things that make a Catholic school distinctive:

- · learning is shaped using Gospel values;
- prayer, worship and religious celebrations are integral to the life of the school;
- we promote social justice and serve our communities;
- our school values of respect, love, trust, tolerance and integrity encapsulate our Catholic ethos.

The circumstances of the last two years posed real challenges for so many in our schools, parish and wider communities. We saw the closure of our schools and parishes and worked through the tentative attempts to reopen and reimagine how we could function safely in an ever-changing landscape. As with any enforced change, we were put into a situation where we could reflect upon what we had lost and come to value it all the more.

Celebration and worship is such a big part of what we do and of who we are in St Benedict's. Prayer and the sacramental life of our school is absolutely central to who we are and to how we grow as a community. It is also why the links we have with our associated primaries and parishes are so important to us. The St. Benedict's cluster works in close collaboration to enhance the vision of Catholic education.

Over the past two years we have found innovative ways to celebrate and worship in St. Benedict's as we were not allowed to gather as a school community. We have live-streamed Masses and pre-recorded services which are broadcast in every classroom. We begin every day with the school prayer in all classes and we celebrate Mass every Friday lunchtime in our school Oratory.





We are challenged to use our talents for the service of others and we demonstrate this in a variety of ways in St. Benedict's:

- Our annual foodbank collection for the Trussell Trust to help the most needy in our community.
- We participate in "Light up a life" during advent to remember our loved ones who have passed away, whilst raising funds for St. Vincent's Hospice.
- Several R.E. classes have sponsored children through Mary's Meals.
- Thirty-nine of our S6 pupils are participating in the Caritas programme where they carry out 40 hours of school and parish faith-related activities.
- Over the past year, we have assisted St. Conval's Parish in providing 200 meals and toiletries to needy families on a weekly basis. More than 100 families receive Christmas dinner through the project.
- During Lent we support SCIAF by carrying out a variety of fundraising events in addition to the Wee Box appeal.
- S6 organise a Santa Dash which the whole school participates in. This year the money raised will be split between, St. Vincent's Hospice, Scottish Association for Mental Health and our Malawi partnership.
- Unfortunately two partnership visits with St. Patrick's in Malawi have been cancelled due to travel restrictions, but we continue to support the boys as best we can. We provided sanitising stations for the school and we are currently preparing their Christmas parcels.

In St. Benedict's we are growing in our learning and growing in our love of God and neighbour through celebration and worship and we very thankful to our local clergy and for the tremendous support we receive from them.

In the words of Pope Benedict XVI, during his visit in 2010, "A good school provides a rounded education for the whole person. And a good Catholic school, over and above this, should help all its students to become saints."

We will continue to remember you in our prayers and we ask that you remember us.


What is MVP?

Mentors in Violence Prevention (MVP) is a peer mentoring programme that gives young people the chance to explore and challenge the attitudes, beliefs and cultural norms that underpin gender-based violence, bullying and other forms of violence.

It addresses a range of behaviours including name-calling, controlling behaviour and harassment, and uses a 'by-stander' approach where individuals are not looked on as potential victims or perpetrators but as empowered and active bystanders with the ability to support and challenge their peers in a safe way.

The mentors have delivered the first two core lessons to all of second year and will be continuing their work in the new year. Well done mentors!

The Health and Safety of all members of our school community is of paramount importance. We have a number of arrangements in place to stop the spread of the virus. These are regularly evaluated.

Here is a summary of some of our key mitigations:

- Pupils and staff sanitise on entry / exit to the building.
- Pupils sanitise on entry to classrooms before cleaning their work area with spray.
- Pupils and staff wear masks when in the school building. The only exception is when they are having their lunch or snack.
- We notify parents/carers when there has been a positive case.
- We encourage pupils to access the vaccine.
- We encourage staff and pupils to take lateral flow tests on a regular basis and record results. These are available for pick up at the school office. This is crucial especially with the recent increase with the Omicron variant.
- Pupils are allocated specific areas for lunchtime ensuring they are in a year group bubbles.
- There is a one-way system ensuring pupils are not face to face when moving between classes.
- We encourage pupils to socially distance as much as possible.
- We ensure there is appropriate ventilation through the opening of windows and doors.
- We regularly remind pupils through assemblies and signage throughout the school, of the importance of following all of the mitigations above.
- Staff also follow the above mitigations and have adapted their learning and teaching approaches.
- I would ask for your continued support and urge you to inform the school of any positive COVID cases in your family bubble.













Digital Learning



Over the past 20 months, we have continued to develop our digital learning approaches.

Our main platforms continue to be Satchel One and Microsoft teams.

Satchel One provides both yourself and your child with details of homework issued and submission dates.

Microsoft TEAMS is a pupil learning platform - resources linked to their daily lessons and courses are made available for them to access.

Homework

Homework and home study continues to be a crucial part of learning.

As a guide your child should be working for approximately these times per week:

S1-S3: 5 hoursS4: 6 hours

S5/6: 7 hours

Throughout the year there is a supported study programme for senior pupils, and we have recently introduced a weekly lunchtime Homework Club for S1- S3 pupils. Please encourage your child to attend.



School Library

The School Library has resumed normal service this term, we are open Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays 8am-4pm, including at lunchtimes and break times for pupils to browse, borrow and read books or use the library space as a place to study.

The library's new librarians are Mr Kerr (on Mondays) and Miss Thompson (on Wednesdays and Thursdays). You can <u>browse the library's physical collections by searching our catalogue</u>. You can also <u>browse Renfrewshire Libraries extensive e-resources (e-books and audio-books)</u> which are accessible to staff, pupils and parents.

The library has run the following thematic book displays this term:

In terms of new stock, we have enhanced our Manga collection, our holdings on climate change (non-fiction texts and also Cli-Fi) and have started building a 'words for wellbeing' collection which will help pupils manage their mental health and wellbeing by reading non-fiction and fiction.

We have also run several events over term which pupils have enjoyed:

- Manga Club (every Monday lunchtime)
- Book Club (every Thursday lunchtime)
- · Halloween Spooky Read-Aloud
- Halloween Creative Writing Competition (congratulations to Robyn Gray for winning this and a big thank you to everyone else who took part)
- Climate Change Creative Writing Competition (ongoing at time of writing)
- World War One Poetry Read-Aloud (for Remembrance Day)
- For Christmas, we will run a book display and pupils will be able to select a "present" from under the library Christmas tree – a mystery library book for the holidays - wrapped up with only a three-word tag identifying what it is about!





Science Club

Methane Bubbles

Science Club investigated the chemical properties of methane by lighting methane bubbles on fire. Mr Irwin, Mr Kennedy and Mr Coyle then demonstrated methane combustion on their own hands. The young scientists then explored the association between methane and risks posed by climate change. Underneath the ice caps there are many frozen bacteria, if thawed these bacteria could start to multiply and produce methane which would be released into the atmosphere. Increased methane levels in air could prove very harmful to life on earth.





Elephant's Toothpaste Pumpkins

Science Club conducted a Halloween themed investigation of catalysts today. Catalysts are chemicals which speed up the rate of chemical reactions whilst remaining unchanged by the reaction. We observed what happens when the breakdown of hydrogen peroxide to produce oxygen and water is catalysed by potassium iodide. By adding some fairy liquid to the reaction, it becomes elephant's toothpaste. We added a Halloween twist to this experiment by conducting the reaction inside our very own "Science Club" Pumpkin.






Flame Test Fireworks

This week at Science Club our young scientists investigated the chemical properties of a range of metals. They learned that different metals produce different coloured flames when burned and that is why certain metals are used in fireworks. Creation of fireworks is a science to produce the wonderful range of colours we see when fireworks explode. We concluded this session with an in-class (but very safe) fireworks display from our very own Mr Irwin!







Sound and Rubens Tube

Science Club looked at how sound travels from a source to our ears. We watched as a loud speaker moved backwards and forwards to produce a sound. We spoke about how it was hitting against the particles in the air to send a vibration (sound wave) through the air so it can reach our ears. Then the young scientists got the chance to use the Rubens tube. The Rubens tube is a long tube filled with gas with holes on the top. When the gas is ignited and a sound is played through a loudspeaker at one end the flames on the top produce a wave so we can see the sound travel. The scientists then got to sing into a microphone as we watched the sound they produced move through the tube.




Van de Graaff

This week the young scientists were investigating electrical charge using the Van de Graaf generator. The Van de Graaff generator is a machine with a big metal dome that becomes positively charged as a rubber band is quickly rubbed against it. We watched as sparks flew, cake tins were thrown off the dome and a few of the scientists' hair stood up on end. We discussed how things with opposite electrical charge are attracted to each other while things with similar charges are repelled by each other. We used this information to work out that our hair was standing on end as they all had a similar charge and wanted to get away from each other.

Density Rainbows

This week Science Club developed their understanding of density. The young scientists used sugar and water to create coloured sugar solutions with different known densities. They then poured these solutions into a measuring cylinder from most to least dense to produce some wonderful density columns.





Chemist-Trees

This week at Science Club the young scientists began to get into the Christmas spirit. They explored the chemical and physical properties of a range of chemicals. They then used this knowledge to produce some wonderful Chemist-trees which are now sitting pride of place in St. Benedict's Science classrooms.

Football

Primary Transition

The pupils constructed and experimented with their own Mars rover. They collected data which they then processed to reach a conclusion about parachute radius and time taken for rover landing. Whilst leading the construction the pupils also used their creative writing skills to write a story about space exploration.

They also spent some time with St. Benedict's staff to learn about our school values.

The pupils were a credit to our cluster, working diligently together to produce their best work.





















Numeracy

Raising Attainment

St. Benedict's Record Attainment

Over the past years a wide variety of strategies have been employed to raise the attainment of young people in the Senior Phase (S4-S6). By building on the excellent learning and teaching which takes place in St. Benedict's High School, we have been able to make significant improvements in attainment. These strategies and the hard work of all of our students, especially in very trying times, has led to St. Benedict's outperforming similar schools in all the key measures for S4, S5 and S6.





B.G.E. Homework Club

Our BGE Homework Club (S1-S3) takes place every Wednesday at lunchtime. Our Raising Attainment Project Leader, Miss Gillespie, works alongside other staff volunteers and S6 students to provide help and support to S1-S3 pupils in their learning. Please encourage your children to come along for a quiet place to work and access to ICT. You can check your child's homework through the Satchel One app. Please contact the school if you have any difficulty using this and we will be happy to help.

Senior Phase Mentor Programme

As in previous years, our Senior Phase Mentor Programme is up and running. Mentors are volunteer staff members who serve as an additional point of contact for Senior Phase students in S4 and S5. This enhanced support builds on the work of Pastoral and Year Head and provides young people with the opportunity to discuss their achievements and concerns as they make progress throughout the year towards the prelims and the final exam diet in May. Staff offer support and advice regarding study skills, wellbeing and target setting at regular points in the school year. We will meet again before the Christmas holidays to ensure that students have a clear study timetable, are focused and coping with the demands that prelims will bring. This is to enable our young people to achieve their full potential across all subjects.

This session our extended mentoring programme will be run by our Employability Key Worker, Lisa Wiggins. This programme sees a group of S5 students working closely during mentor time to prepare students for interviews as well as tips and guidance on how to dress and behave in an interview situation. These skills will be invaluable in building young people's confidence as they prepare to move out into the world of employment.



S5 Raising Attainment Seminar

Following the very unsettled nature of the past few years, it is essential that all students feel fully supported and well prepared for the forthcoming prelims. Recently, we were delighted to be able again to deliver our S5 Raising Attainment Seminar which was a great success.

The morning consisted of a motivational talk by Mr Sinclair and a range of workshops such as study skills, mindsets and meta-cognition as well as team building, health and well-being and mindfulness. These workshops were delivered by volunteer staff who are always keen to do the best they can for all our young people.

Our S6 students also contributed, providing an invaluable input to the day as they shared their experience of assessments with our current S5. Both positive and negative experiences were shared between students in order to ensure S5 can learn from the insight of their older peers.

Our final event of the day saw students attend an elective "Next Step" workshop where they chose from guidance in Careers, UCAS or Modern/Foundation Apprenticeships. Student feedback made clear that this was a particularly successful part of the day with pupils gaining a clearer understanding of where their learning can take them in future.

Our attainment seminars are designed to equip our students with the skills required to achieve their potential in the forthcoming exams, but it is equally important that we support our pupils to cope with the inevitable stress and pressure which they will experience. One of the key missions of our programme is to help our students to realise that they are resilient, have the capacity to cope and, with appropriate levels of study and support, are destined to achieve.

We are looking forward to delivering a similar programme in February for our S4 students.




Going for Bronze - SCQF Schools Ambassador Programme

We are now at the stage of developing and renewing our Curriculum Rationale and in keeping with the ethos of our Catholic school, we aim to support attainment in its widest context. As such, we have recently become an SCQF Schools Ambassador School. This programme offers the opportunity to learn more about the benefits of the SCQF and the wider ways in which it supports learners such as recognising wider achievement, developing Senior Phase learning pathways in line with the Developing the Young Workforce strategy and giving equality between vocational and academic qualifications. One of the main aspects of this programme is enabling students themselves to become Pupil Ambassadors and we will deliver training sessions so they can help to raise awareness and use their creativity to engage peers and parents. The courses that we have implemented as a result of our commitment to the SCQF Schools Ambassador Programme include a range of National Progression Awards (NPAs). Through wider achievement, we also feel strongly that our young people should gain accreditation in areas that they are involved with out with our classrooms. We will keep you informed of our progress as we embark upon this programme.

In addition, in September, all S6 students were provided with First Aid training to gain the Level 6 qualification in "Emergency First Aid at Work". This not only enhances the CVs of our young people and makes them more attractive to prospective employers, but it also provides them with opportunities to show their abilities to learn in a different context from the traditional curriculum.

Celebrating the success of our school community promotes our positive school ethos and empowers our community.

Wellbeing Ambassador Training

Sixteen Senior pupils signed up to do Wellbeing Ambassador Training with Mr Harvey and developed their skills in the following areas:

This training will allow our seniors to mentor pupils to hopefully improve their general wellbeing in all areas of their life.



Mental Health Support

In January a new Mental Health support club will open in the school for all pupils to drop in if they need support with their mental health.

This will be supported by Mr Harvey and trained Sixth Year pupils who will complete the Wellbeing Ambassador Training.

We hope this provides pupils with a place they can visit for support and advice on their mental wellbeing in 2022.



House System

Our House System has been up and running now for over two years and we continue to make improvements to support and motivate our young people. Each House is competing for a reward day at the cinema followed by a pizza buffet in school come Easter time.

Pupils can win points for their House in the following ways:

- Health & Wellbeing points walk or cycle to school!
- Departmental Awards in each subject
- Monthly Tracking points through effort, behaviour and homework
- Attendance points for 95% and above each month.
- House Hero points for exceptional contribution to the ethos of the school and the local community.

Each house group has had two house assemblies this term. During these services classes come together as a community and celebrate the positive impact all pupils have had on the school community. 







Science





SfL Literacy and ICT:



Monitoring and tracking of your child's progress helps us to ensure your child can achieve their potential and is therefore a very important part of his/her education.

As part of our monitoring and tracking system, your child will be involved in regular discussions with staff to identify strengths, areas for development and next steps. Please also discuss these reports with your child.

Over the course of a full session, you will receive the following communication.

The school calendar on the website highlights the dates these are issued.

- 1. A full written report detailing your child's strengths and areas for development within each subject of study.
- 2. Tracking reports detailing levels of achievement and ratings for effort, behaviour and homework.
- 3. A parent-teacher online meeting with an opportunity for a verbal report.
